

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#### Joint Plan

This travel plan is presented by both the East Preston Infant School and the East Preston Junior School. Although each of the schools are separate establishments, they are on the same campus, shared also with the East Preston Children's and Family Centre, Rascals Before and After School Club and the Youth Service, and therefore all experience very similar travel issues. The plan is being developed to provide a framework to help pupils, parents, staff and the wider community to adopt safer and more sustainable travel habits when in or around the school grounds

#### Introduction

East Preston is a village and civil parish in the Arun District of West Sussex, England. It lies roughly half way between Littlehampton and Worthing. It is primarily residential and currently has a population of 8000+ which is steadily growing.

East Preston is a village divided by a railway line, with two level crossings. Despite improvements to both vehicular and pedestrian access over the the Eastern level crossing following previous travel plans, there are still concerns regarding the safety of pedestrians, around this area, as 3 roads converge at the level crossing point.

East Preston comprises the following residential areas: Kingston Gorse, West Kingston, Angmering on sea, East Preston Village and The Willowhayne.

The original village school building nowadays houses an estate agent firm. It was built in 1840 and started as a Sunday School. Over time the building was enlarged into the village school until it was given to Sussex County Council in 1940. This building remained as the village school until 1951 when the new school in Lashmar Road was opened. In 1973 the Infant School was built and the Junior school occupied the original school buildings.

Sharing the site is the Children's and Family Centre and Rascals breakfast/after school club which also operates a holiday club scheme during the school holidays. Access to the site is through either the main entrance on Lashmar Road, (car park gates and two pedestrian entrances either side) or via St Mary's Drive, where there is additional staff parking and a further two pedestrian gates.

The roll of the two schools will be 460 in September 2015, potentially rising to 630 by September 2021 due to school expansion (see future plans section). The age range of the pupils is between 4 and 11 years, with years R to 2 at the Infant school and years 3 to 6 at the Junior school.

The schools have staggered start times for the school day between 8:30 and 9:00 and pick up between 15:00 and 15:30. There are numerous before school clubs and after school activities including: Karate, Beefit, football, tennis, golf, choir and gym.

Like most communities there are a large number of vehicles on the roads of the village and we already experience a substantial problem with cars in the immediate vicinity of the schools at dropping off and picking up times (08:30 – 09:00, 15:00 – 15:30).

# **Travel Plan Working Group**

The Travel Plan Working Group is made up between the two schools, an informal meeting is held each term and the school council come up with ideas for consideration:

## **Staff Travel**

The Infant school has 10 full time and 20 part time staff, whilst the Junior School has 13 full time and 19 part time staff. A number of staff live over 5km from the school so have to drive to school as public transport does not fit with the school times. We promote the links to the WSCC staff discounts for rail and bus travel. In recent years extra parking spaces have been provided on site so there is enough parking for all staff and visitors on site. There is a shortage of parking for junior staff-and several park off site. Additional on-street parking can be found in Lashmar Road or St Mary's Drive.

#### **Futures Plans at the school**

Due to the increased amount of new development in or close to the village and the proposed expansion to 3 form entry for both schools (Infants September 2015 and Juniors September 2018). Access to the site may be affected by the building work, and building contractors are advised to avoid the school pickup times and drop off for any deliveries on site so there is no impact on parents on the school run.

The increase in pupil numbers each year is shown in the table below. The number of staff will also increase. This is expected to be two extra members of staff per 30 children at Infant age and at least one teacher per additional 30 children at Junior age, however this may vary depending on specific needs or if more support staff are required. (Midday meals supervisors or administrative staff. This is unquantifiable at present but is expected to be minimal)

# **Initiatives and Promotions of Sustainable Transport**

We are both Heathy Schools and Eco schools and the pupils are actively involved in learning about being green and designing posters. For the last year the Infant school has been doing Forest School activities and is shortly due to start Beach School in the next academic year. The junior school children have made posters persuading children to walk to school and to drive safely

The travel plan is promoted to parents and the wider school community through newsletters, notice boards and on the school web site. We actively encourage and facilitate children and families who are able to, to walk to school

## **Working with Others**

As mentioned before there are four services on our site who all work closely together, which are the Infant and Junior Schools and also the Children and Family Centre and Rascals breakfast/after school club. We also work with the local Police and parish council.

## **School Trips and Extended School Activities**

For local trips parent helpers volunteer to help the children walk safely to and from their destination. For trips further afield we hire coaches who park outside the school gates (both at Lashmar and St Mary's Drive) and local trips which we also ask parents if they can volunteer to help with. Rascals have a Minibus on site which we can ask to use.

#### **Curriculum Links**

There are numerous links to the school curriculum across both schools:

Infants & Juniors

Maths – distance

Geography – map reading

English – reading instructions and signs

Through curriculum work, continue to raise awareness with the children and eventually therefore the parents, of the benefits of walking to school rather than by travelling in a car.
